Letter Bomb Explodes at the Office of a Swiss Nuclear Industry Lobbying Group

Two employees were injured when a letter bomb exploded at the office of Swissnuclear in the northern Swiss town of Olten on March 31, 2011, at 7:45 local time, as personnel were opening the mail.

The postage stamps on the padded envelope were Italian, but there was no postmark, authorities said. The sender's address was that of the four-nation military alliance, Eurofor, based in Florence, Italy. The device, hidden inside a CD case and rigged using a 9V battery, was identical to letter bombs used by the violent Italian anarchist group FAI (Informal Anarchist Federation).

The incident took place several hours before another package exploded at a military barracks in Italy. Additionally, a mail bomb sent to a maximum-security prison in Greece, was defused.

A group of anarchists from Italy has since claimed responsibility for the letter bomb attack.
